Shining a light on LED

With lighting generally reckoned to account for around 33% of the electricity used in modern buildings, a percentage which may be even higher in large acute hospitals operating 24/7, many health estate managers will naturally be focusing on making their lighting more cost and energy-efficient.

One technology to have made particular inroads in healthcare, as in other spheres, is LED, which large suppliers like Philips and Osram say not only offers a considerably longer lifespan than many other existing lighting systems, but is also more reliable, and, (they claim) can bring substantial energy savings over, for example, fluorescent lighting.

LED lighting is undoubtedly becoming increasingly sophisticated, in terms of the colours, effects, and moods, it can create, as well as becoming more and more 'efficient', and flexible, as the technology moves forward.

Nicholas Bukorović, a lighting expert who currently chairs the CIBSE/Society of Light and Lighting Hospital Lighting Group, however, questions, on pages 47-52, whether some of the claims being made for LED may be being a little exaggerated. He is particularly concerned that a number of manufacturers with neither the skills nor technical expertise to produce safe, high quality, and reliable LED products, may have entered the market. In the article he outlines his concerns, considers the minimum lighting standards and criteria applicable to healthcare, and highlights some of the areas where he believes LED lighting really does score.

This IFHE issue also includes articles on a 10-year new build and redevelopment programme to create one of Norway's most advanced hospitals, examines, from a lawyer's standpoint, some of PFI's pros and cons, highlights the use of an innovative mixed ventilation strategy at a Sunderland primary care centre which has helped it become the UK's first large healthcare building to achieve a BREEAM 'Outstanding' rating, and examines some of the cost-effective, and surprisingly straightforward, ways to enhance the dementia care environment.

Manchester event to take place in a pivotal year
